First Lesson: Isaiah 35:1-10

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad,



Holy Communion

Everyone is welcome to receive communion at St. Bart's! Hand sanitizer is available in the aisle. Please use the side aisles to return to your seat once you have received.
