A Report from the Vestry

February marks the first month for a new Vestry to begin its work after its election at the January Annual Meeting. As you know, the 2021 Vestry is the same Vestry from 2020 as it was decided that it was in the best interest of St. Bart's to have continuity while we are in transition after Nina's departure and to maintain stability during the pandemic. It's a good team and we work well together.

There are many active committees functioning at this time and their reports are in this issue of the Mustard Seed. We are so blessed to have so many members doing the work of St. Bart's!

For this Warden's Report we have two items to share with you.

Concerns have been raised about the condition of several trees on the property and the potential risk of damage to the church building. We plan to have 6 trees removed including a few towering pines that enhance the view from the sanctuary. Two of the pines are near the Memorial Garden and another is leaning toward the church office. Joe Michaud and Liza Chandler are seeking bids for completion of the work before the ground thaws. It is disappointing to have to do this work but it needs to be done to prevent serious damage to the church. The Vestry approved the cost of removing the trees pending the receipt of estimates.

On March 28, we will be visited by Bishop Brown. Plans are under way to determine the safest way for our community to engage with Bishop Brown. Nothing is firm yet, but we hope that he will come to St. Bart's to record the Palm Sunday service on the Thursday prior. Then, following the service we will be inviting him to join us at our Zoom coffee hour. We will be connecting our awesome Worship Committee with the Bishop's office to collaborate on the service. The Vestry will also arrange for a Zoom meeting with the Bishop either the week before or the week after to share where we are as a church community. We are honored to welcome Bishop Brown and we are thankful for the support that he has been giving us during transition and for his leadership during the pandemic.

The following message regarding his visit is from Bishop Brown:

Worship

When I join you for an episcopal visitation I will preside and preach at the Holy Eucharist. During this season of our getting acquainted, creating relationships, and learning from one another, it's essential for clergy and lay leaders to help me enter into your pattern and practice of how you praise and worship the living God. I trust your liturgical decision-making and promise to have a conversation with you if I have questions or concerns. I hope you will do likewise.

Conversation

It's my sincerest hope that conversations will be abundant symbols of every episcopal visitation. I'm eager to hear from and talk to the primary leader of the congregation (usually this is the rector, vicar, or priest-in-charge), the vestry or the bishop's committee, and with parishioners. The conversations can take whatever form you think best. I would like to hear from the congregation their stories of faith, as well as to listen to descriptions about what's currently sparking joy. Of course, I want also to know about what's challenging, and to offer my support and that of the diocesan staff. Questions about the Diocese of Maine or the Episcopal Church are welcomed.

DISCERNING GOD'S CALL

Discernment Process Update

Last month the Vestry created a Discernment Committee charged with asking the parish to answer the questions "Who are we?" and "What is God Calling us to Do?" as we prepare to hire a new priest hopefully later this year. John Duncan and Michele Johns are co-chairing the

committee and the other members are Kathy Abernathy, Pam Hobson, Tom Hyndman, Mike Perfetti, and Susie Soule. *Feel free to reach out to any of us with your thoughts and questions.*

The Discernment Committee has met three times already. Our initial work is to craft a list of questions to be used in interviews of about thirty-five (35) member households. The interviews will be done in March and April, and we are aiming to send a summary report to the Vestry in May. (We are also going to conduct some focus group conversations, reach out to other churches and reach out to other organizations in the community outside our church walls.)

We will be working with fellow parishioner Peter Small, who has a wealth of professional and volunteer experience in opinion research and consultation. We are very grateful that Peter has offered to conduct the interviews and summarize his findings in a report. We will mail and email to all parish members the details of the interview and focus group processes.

As many of you have heard, or read in recent E-Bulletins, the Vestry is asking all of us to be open to all possibilities, including consideration of how our future together might look within the context of part-time clergy. While it is the opinion of the vestry that less than full time clergy is the best way forward for our parish, given our financial realities and our perception that our congregation wants more involvement in the larger community, it is NOT a directive. We are asking that the discernment process proceed with this as a real possibility, and not a negative one, so that we all have more freedom to dream when striving to answer the question "what is God calling us to do?" You also may have heard in recent conversations of a book entitled "Part-Time is Plenty" which has opened our eyes to many possibilities. The Discernment Committee is going to present a summary of the book and lead a discussion at a March coffee hour (date to be determined).



St. Bart's Prayer Shawl Ministry

St Bart's Prayer Shawl Ministry was begun in 2004 by Carole (Closser) Sweet and other St Bart's women. They were inspired by the book: *Knitting into the Mystery, A Guide to the Shawl Knitting Ministry*. The group was informal and knit when shawls & blankets were needed. Through the years over 200 prayer shawls and blankets have been given to parishioners and friends. Henry Harder was given the first shawl, knit by Carole, a few months before he died.

The patterns created by the original knitting group were made available to anyone interested. The recommendation was to use 2 skeins of washable acrylic yarn such as "Lion Brand" worsted or Homespun. The basic pattern is knit 3, purl 3, and repeat. Groups of 3 stitches symbolize the trinity. Yarn and supplies are often donated to the group for their use. Mother of Purl Yarn shop supports our work with a discount on yarn that will be used for shawls and blankets.

The Afternoon Handwork Group began meeting to knit and visit in the spring of 2009. Cynthia Taliaferro brought the idea from her time attending St. Michael's church in Charleston, SC. The group began meeting two times a month in the sanctuary, then in the chapel, and are currently meeting weekly (2020-2021) by Zoom on Monday afternoons 3-4:30pm. There is no agenda other than getting together to visit, share a cup of tea and check in. The group works on a variety of handwork projects including: knitting, crochet, making origami, holiday decorations, gift bags, and assembling masks. Conversation varies from help with knitting projects and sharing patterns, to recently read books, good movies, and sharing tasty recipes. The Zoom link is posted in the weekly St Bart's email bulletin. If you are interested in learning to make a Prayer Shawl or Blanket, please join a Zoom or email Liza Chandler at liza.b.chandler@gmail.com.

During the time that Nina Pooley has been the rector (2006-2020), 200+ prayer shawls, lap blankets, and baby blankets have been donated, and given to parishioners and friends. The shawls and blankets were blessed during services with all in attendance participating, see blessing below. During Covid time, blessings are by zoom or in small groups who meet briefly using safety protocols. The blessing is then attached to each shawl/blanket with the name of the person that knit the blanket and the date it was blessed.




How it works:

It has been a busy and exciting time at **St. Elizabeth's** of late. Sad as we were to see our wonderful former Executive Director Holly Hoffmann depart for MDI, she has energized St. Elizabeth's in so many ways. Finding her replacement has been quite successful and we are delighted to welcome the new Executive Director, **Sarah Coburn Borgeson**. Sarah has a Master's Degree in Social Work and extensive experience in leadership roles with non-profits in the Boston area, including food pantries and most recently as a Community Outreach Coordinator. Please join us in welcoming Sarah as she begins her new position on Tuesday, February, 16th.

Donations to St. Elizabeth's can come in surprising ways. A few weeks ago, one came from **St. Brigid School** in Portland. Anne Jacobs helped a woman from the school unload her minivan behind St. Luke's. She was delivering 110 bags filled with cleaning/personal hygiene items for St. Elizabeth's. School children, ages Pre-K to 8th grade, packed the bags as an Outreach Project. Each bag contained laundry detergent, sponges, toilet bowl cleaner, other cleaning products, toothpaste, soap bar, and shampoo. We received this donation through our partnership with **Maine Needs**.



St. Elizabeth's sources donations of essential products from Maine Needs, Partners for World Health, schools, colleges, and it's seven sponsoring churches, including St. Bart's.

Every week the "super star" volunteers stand outside (and it can get cold!) distributing toilet paper, soap, laundry detergent, etc. and especially good cheer. Meanwhile, a few other volunteers work inside "socially distanced" packaging up diapers or filling individual bags with rolls of toilet paper to be distributed. Many thanks to Nancy Gunzelmann and Pam Hobson who have helped out with this task. With nearly 150 people showing up each week, these items move quickly. Even with fewer volunteers gathering each week due to COVID restrictions, it is amazing how much is accomplished on the front lines as well as behind the scenes with dedicated volunteers. What an amazing ministry!


